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Jillian Zuckerman says she's never been a "pencil and paper teacher." And now, through the professional development (PD) opportunities at Associated – such as literacy coaching and Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) – she's able to share her ideas about engaging students with other teachers across the system.

Zuckerman's own classroom could make even the most tech-savvy person dizzy. Her students use interactive apps like Glogster to create character studies. Students prepare presentations using videos and images as well as text.

"It's hands-on," she explains about her teaching style. "I want kids moving and having choice. I think it's important to hook them in and listen to them."

This year Zuckerman is a Grade 5 General Studies classroom teacher, a literacy coach and a PLC leader – allowing her to share what she's learned with other teachers.

"One of my strengths has always been to think outside the box and come up with innovative ways to focus on the curriculum," she says. "Our high level professional development has transformed our school culture. We are a school that puts growing and learning for teachers at the heart of educational achievement for our students," says Dr. Mark Smiley, Head of School.

That growth for teachers extends beyond sharing knowledge from classroom to classroom. Rabbi Shlomo Gemara, from the Danilack Middle School, was invited to be part of a team that attended an innovative conference in New York on creating standards and benchmarks in teaching Rabbinics. The results from the three-part workshop will ultimately shape how Jewish ethics and values are taught at the whole school.

"This experience deepened my commitment and love of Jewish education enormously," he says.

Rabbi Gemara says he is constantly amazed at the school's commitment to PD.

"It's taken so seriously and ingrained in the culture of the school. I know that every teacher is teaching better thanks to this professional development."

began organically for Erin Norris and Larry Davidson '89, parents of three young students at the Posluns Education Centre. Watching their children thrive in school, Erin and Larry felt fortunate to discover that AHS emphasized the values of community, respect, and inclusiveness that they strive to instill in their own home.

Erin, a rheumatologist, and Larry, who oversees the operations of North American Produce, a family-run fruit importing business, were inspired to begin supplying the monthly Rosh Chodesh ceremonies with fresh fruit for the students. From there, the couple decided to provide fresh fruit snacks for the Posluns Bet Hayeled. For Larry, an AHS graduate, the example of giving was set for him as a young child by his grandfather, Morris Shoom, founder of North American Produce and a committed philanthropist and lover of children.

"My Zaydie was a great supporter of the Jewish community, and what he did...I saw. I want to set the same example for my children," Larry says.

Most recently, Larry and Erin have generously funded upgrades to Posluns's popular "*Pinat Chai*," a living creatures corner that engages the students in hands-on learning. Thanks to this generous gift, AHS was able to purchase techonolical enhancements such as a new TV, 3-D printer, and coding robots, as well as adding new animals to the *Pinat Chai*. "Our son, Judah, really loves animals, and this was a great opportunity to give back to the school and enhance the environment for all of the students," the proud parents explain.

As Erin puts it, "A building is just a building until you put the community into it." Through their commitment to enhancing Jewish education, the Davidsons are strengthening the AHS community for years to come.

Associated's Littlest Mensches are Thriving



THE CLASSROOMS AT ASSOCIATED'S NEWEST PRESCHOOL, HOUSED AT BETH SHOLOM SYNAGOGUE IN CEDARVALE, ARE FILLED WITH THE SIGHTS AND SOUNDS OF STUDENTS SINGING, DANCING AND LEARNING, ALL WITHIN THE WARM JEWISH ENVIRONMENT FOR WHICH AHS IS KNOWN.

With a multitude of programs, including **Mini Mensch and Me** (a parent/caregiver and tot class), **Mini Mensch and Beyond** (a drop off program for toddlers) and the **Nursery program**, Associated Cedarvale's student body has more than doubled to a total of 115 children since the branch began in 2012, says Branch Coordinator, Leah Levy.

AHS also offers Early Years programs, grouped under the moniker "Bet Hayeled," at its Posluns and Kamin Education Centres. All branches provide a variety of exciting activities, including gym, music and movement, arts and crafts and Judaic learning.

At Kamin, the Mini Mensch program is also proving popular, recently increasing its offering from two to four days per week, due to overwhelming demand. "These programs provide a wonderful opportunity for even very young children to develop their social and emotional skills," says Kamin's Bet Hayeled Vice Principal, Bari Horowitz.

"The preschool years are a significant period for building personal identity, and set the foundation for future learning," affirms Ora Shulman, Principal of Judaic Studies at Posluns Education Centre. AHS's outstanding Early Years programs provide an enriched curriculum that introduces early literacy skills, Shabbat, holidays, and Hebrew language acquisition.

Jill Charnaw-Burger and Marc Burger '88, have sent their three children through the Posluns Bet Hayeled, and Jill has glowing things to say about the program. "Parents can have complete confidence that their children are in the hands of loving, committed educators," says Jill. "The program is second to none... it provides a cutting edge curriculum that truly understands child development and responds to the needs of the students. I wholeheartedly recommend the program... it will become a second family for you and your children".

GROWING UP IN A TRADITIONAL JEWISH HOUSEHOLD in Providence,

Rhode Island, Joyce Rifkind only dreamed of the thriving Jewish community she's come to find in her adopted city of Toronto. Her husband, Aaron, hailing from Edinburgh, Scotland, with a population of only 1,000 Jews, echoes this sentiment. "We didn't have access to the benefits of a day school education, the depth of learning, and richness of community," he says.

After living in Hamilton for Aaron's medical training, the desire to provide a first-rate Jewish education for their children led the Rifkinds to Toronto and to Associated. As a young mother, Joyce got involved in the AHS Parents Association, developing friendships that last to this day. Currently, Joyce serves on the AHS Board, she, along with her husband, supports the annual Kadima campaign, and she and Aaron take pride in their grandchildren, three of whom are current AHS students, with a fourth set to start JK in the fall.

When asked why she devotes both her time and financial support to the school, Joyce lights up describing the joy she feels watching her children and grandchildren grow up as part of a proud and thriving Jewish community.



Associated's commitment to developing leadership and nurturing community amongst the school's students begins early. At just eight years of age, Evan Axler and Miriam Weinstein are already practicing these skills as part of a Grade 3 buddy program called *Mashkinei Shalom* at the AHS Posluns Education Centre. Acting as peacemakers and mentors, the buddies learn conflict resolution, communication, and responsibility as they work to mediate conflicts and keep the playground safe. "By implementing the program, we are creating an inclusive environment and building essential skills that will aid in resolving conflicts peacefully," says Ora Shulman, Judaic Studies Principal at Posluns.

Kamin Education Centre runs a similar schoolyard buddy program, and also develops opportunities for cross-grade learning and partnership through mentorship programming. One touching example is a special *tekes* (ceremony) which welcomes Grade 1 students to the elementary school and pairs them with Grade 5 students. The partners enter the *tekes* together under a tallit and sing to each other, as the older students usher the little ones into this new phase of school life. These relationships develop throughout the year,

with the students getting together for holiday programming, workshops, and other engaging activities.

Opportunities for mentorship continue at the Danilack Middle School, which runs a year-long program matching up Grade 8's with incoming Grade 6 students to ease the transition to middle school. Offering not only a friendly face in a new environment, the Grade 8 students are trained to provide concrete support in organization and study skills, as well as everyday guidance on middle school routines such as lockers, schedules, and homework.

As Posluns buddy Evan states, "Being a buddy is hard work and I love it." Miriam agrees, "I feel great," she says, "I'm helping kids solve problems".

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Beloved wife of Enio, and mother of four Associated alumni, Justin '96, Jared '98, Jordan '00, and Jennel '02. Esther took on every role with her trademark style and grace, and always did a remarkable job, no matter how tall the task. She juggled family, work and community with aplomb and always with a smile on her face. Esther was a mentor to many. We miss her already."

Associated is forever grateful for Esther's devotion to our school, our students and our mission. She has left an indelible mark on our community and she will be greatly missed by all who had the pleasure to know her.

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On a beautiful, bright February

afternoon, three inspiring women from two different generations met for lunch. Their connection? A deep and unshakeable commitment to supporting quality Jewish education.

Julia Koschitzky, the hostess, passed around soup, salads and salmon. She turned to Shirley Granovsky and said, "This is the circle. Everything that goes around, comes around. I met your husband, Phil, through my community work at UJA. We've been bonded ever since by a life-long friendship. You inspire us."

Indeed, all the women – Mrs. Koschitzky, Mrs. Granovsky, Gerda Frieberg and Gabi Weisfeld (who could not attend, but was in touch later by phone from Florida) are inspirations. Between them – the *Arbah Emahot* of Associated – in the last two years alone, have donated over \$2.5 million dollars for tuition support for AHS families.

"I always wanted to give back," says Mrs. Granovsky, who sent three of her four children to AHS. "Because I was helped out in my early years."

Mrs. Frieberg nodded. She is a Holocaust survivor and comes every year to speak with the Grade 8 students about her experience. "We came here with \$80 in our pockets!" she said. "Our Jewish school and synagogue in Germany was burnt down during Kristallnacht."

And while she couldn't afford to send her own children to Jewish day school, three of her grandchildren are graduates of AHS.

"I just want to make sure that children can go," she said as to why she gives to the school. "If we don't educate the children as Jews, there will be no Jews left."

Gabi Weisfeld agrees. She got involved with AHS after she married Louis Weisfeld, a past Board President and dedicated school leader. "Jewish education – there's nothing better!" she said, over the phone from Florida. "There's nothing more important than the future of our community. And the future sits in the school system. These same kids will be tomorrow's leaders." But it's the leaders from yesterday who continue to inspire these women.

"I think back to the immigrants who came here with nothing," said Mrs. Koschitzky. Through the Julia and Henry Koschitzky Centre for Jewish Education, she and her husband offer funding to a number of schools in the GTA. "But they had such strong values. We're building on what they created. It's a sense of obligation and a sense of responsibility."

"Education is preparation for life," said Mrs. Frieberg. "Especially after the Holocaust. We need to appreciate what we have. [Funding for Jewish education] is doable if we care enough."

And when asked what advice they would give to the upcoming generation about supporting Jewish education, the women were very clear about the importance of giving back.

"Everyone should do the very best they can to give the most that they can. Some can afford more, some can afford less. We do the best we can with what we've got," said Mrs. Weisfeld.

"You're not just here for yourself," said Mrs. Koschitzky. "The Torah tells you, even if you have very little, you have to give something."

Mrs. Granovsky agreed. She explained how her late husband influenced her desire to give by always putting something away for charity. "My husband always believed in tithing, giving a certain percentage of what you earn."

In the end, over tea, Mrs. Frieberg passed around the book she's published about her experience in the Holocaust. She spoke about the beautiful reception she gets from AHS students whenever she comes to talk. As far as seeing the value in her continued support, she said, **"We owe it to the**

next generation. Every child we bring into [the school] is a gem."

When Lisa Kobrin introduces iPads into a JK classroom, she sees the devices as vehicles for

collaboration and storytelling.

Lisa Kobrin is the Early Years Coordinator ration," Kobrin says. at the Associated Cedarvale and Kamin Education Centre. Thanks to iParent, a pilot project she introduced, JK and SK students work in small groups with trained parent volunteers to develop a play and storyline using an app called Puppet Pals. Over a number of weeks, students create virtual puppets and record their own voices telling the story. The project helps improve students' oral language and storytelling skills.

But the best part, Kobrin says, is that the students get to share their ideas with each other and then build on them.

"One child says something and then another one adds to it. There's real collabo-

Kamin JK teacher, Jennifer Konopny, says the iParent program is also an opportunity for the school to collaborate and share with parents what is being taught in the classroom.

"The parents enjoy the opportunity to come in and work with the students," she says. "They also benefit from the iPad training because they can bring home what they've learned to their own children."

Technology at the school is also inspiring collaboration between grades. This year, the JK teachers at Kamin started a Computer Buddies program with their classes and the Grade 4s. Grade 4 students accompany the JKs in the computer lab and help them learn how to use a mouse, surf the Internet, or play on popular programs such as Tux Paint.

"The Grade 4s get to build leadership skills," Konopny says. "And the JKs love it because they get to learn so much from being with a buddy."

The use of technology at AHS is also allowing for learning to extend outside the school. Two former TanenbaumCHAT teachers, Rabbi Natanel Javasky and Judy Snowbell Diamond, who both live in Israel, are now offering advanced Torah and Talmud classes over Skype to Grade 7 and 8 Danilack students. Branch Principal, Rabbi Dr. Rafi Cashman, says the distance learning

class is a form of enrichment. Students choose to participate, the class size is small, and they get a lot out of the experience, especially answering questions online after the Skype session is complete.

"The kids love it!" Rabbi Cashman says. "Because of the way the teacher uses Edsby [an online learning forum] with the students, it allows for conversations and interaction to go beyond the classrooms."

Extending learning outside of the classrooms can also mean providing students with new forums to share knowledge. At Posluns, Grade 5 students used a program

called Prezi to prepare visual and oral presentations on the human body. The results were presentations similar to the popular online TED Talks. After a voting process, the top presentations will be submitted to TED, in the hopes that they may be offered to the wider public for viewing.

"There is a shift in how this generation learns," says Elana Shapiro, General Studies Principal at Posluns. "The reality is that by the time they leave the elementary division, they have so much access to information on the Internet. They need to learn to manage, evaluate and be critical, along with how to communicate their own ideas through text, video and images."

It's no longer about teaching technology for the sake of how to work a computer, says Lisa Kobrin. "The reality is that the digital world has converged with teaching in 2016."

A recent study out of the University of Chicago shows that a major cause of math anxiety in students can be parents who are anxious about math themselves. At AHS, however, parents and students get to explore the playful and interactive world of math together.

"At Math Night, parents and students see that math is fun," says Alex Barkin, math specialist at the Posluns Education Centre. "But they also participate in activities that are meaningful and challenging."

Math Night is a tradition at both the Posluns and Kamin Education Centres. This fall, Posluns hosted "Get In The Game" – linking math with sports. Students and parents competed in activities like "Beat The Pros" – a pitch throwing game, and "Are You Smarter Than a 5th Grader."

Parents also came away with a package of information about how to incorporate math in a fun way at home. At Kamin, Math Night happened on the 100th day of school in February. All the activities, from Bet Hayeled to Grade 5, were centered around the number 100, and were applicable to concepts students learned in class, such as measurement and conversion, or everyday activities like baking.

The evening, says Lauren Damelin, Kamin Vice Principal, was a way to take the concepts taught in class and apply them in real life.

"The way we teach math is to break down the students' knowledge and understanding with their thinking and application," Damelin says. "Kids still need to have their basic math facts. But with problem solving, they need to not only have the rote, but to be able to understand the problem and break it down. It's a way of communicating through math. Events like Math Night bridge all those skills together."
